For the 9th year, a select number of participants will work with noted printmaker Linda Goodman in Florence. Italy the flower of the Renaissance. Experience, first-hand, the heritage of Brunelleschi, Michelangelo, Leonardo and scores of artists who made Florence western culture's vital center for over a century. Classes, at an historic international workshop of graphic arts, offers an invigorating three weeks of concentrated instruction, discourse and hands-on studio work in Goodman's specialties of health-conscious monotype, etching and chine collè.

Who should come

People interested in pursuing their visual creativity and enhancing skills in monotype and monoprint, while inspired by enchanting Florence, home base for your "Italian experience." Experienced printmakers may pursue advanced intaglio practices. There are no prerequisites. Previous art background or interest is useful, but an appetite for exploration, enjoyment and camaraderie, avid curiosity and flexibility are what is most required. All levels welcome.

This neighborhood — in the heart of the historic center of Florence near the Pitti Palace, Uffizzi, Ponte Vecchio (Old Bridge), Santa Croce Church, and the Piazzale Michelangelo - is filled with artisans' workshops and characteristic atmosphere. Short walks lead to important city sights. The studios have numer-ous etching presses, storage, drawing and processing areas, and kitchen. There is a lovely outdoor courtyard where we lunch and relax.

Since its founding in 1959, the "Stamperia" has collaborated with renowned artists including Henry Moore. Picasso. Tamayo, and Nathan Oliveira. The workshop's fine print collection is available for viewing and shows in its gallery.

•The focus is on monotype, monoprint, chine collé and drypoint or line etching. Direct and expressive, monotype joins the radiant gualities of prints with the spontaneity of painting. Drypoint/line etching fundamentals are included for those wishing to apply these techniques to monoprint. For all participants, realizing your artistic intent through insightful use of materials and process is paramount.

•Single-run monotype emphasizing painterly methods. Painting and drawing on the surface of metal and plastic plates. Goodman demonstrates beginning to advanced techniques for using water- and oil-based inks, crayons, modifiers and rollers with color printing to achieve brilliant colors and crisp printerly effects.

•Chine collé. This collage process of adhering papers while simultaneously printing on them combines beautiful visuals with content.

•Multi-run color monotype and monoprint. We use several plates to attain rich luminous color and may combine monotype with a repeatable matrix of drypoint or line etching to produce one-of-a-kind prints or a series of related images. •Individual feedback, group critiques, and open work sessions help advanced and beginning artists alike explore their creative potential to develop their work.

•Etching facilities available. Experienced printmakers may use other non-toxic etching or relief processes in the pursuit of their vision with permission of instructor.

•Hill towns. Your guided tour of Siena visits fascinating Romanesque and Gothic sights. Students may also visit the fabled town of eleven towers, San Gimignano. •Independent travel. With churches, shops and other buildings open late there is ample time to visit the city and surrounding areas. Enjoy travel to Rome, Pisa, Lucca, Cinque Terra, Assisi or other towns within 1 to 3 hours of Florence, on your own or with fellow participants. •Venice Biennale. 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The Instructor

Linda Goodman (MFA Printmaking, Mills College; BA Fine Arts, Stanford University) fluent in Italian, has a deep appreciation of Italy, having lived and worked in Florence repeatedly since the

1970s. Her prints, paintings, artist's books, and mixedmedia works have been exhibited widely — including "Florence Today" at Galleria Riva Sinistra, Florence, its symposium and Italian TV — and are in the



collections of the Brooklyn Museum, New York; the Oakland Museum, California; and the Library of Congress, Washington, DC; among others. The San Francisco Bay area artist has taught at the Art Institute of Chicago; San Francisco Art Institute; Whitman College in Washington State; University of Oregon, Eugene; San Francisco State University; University of California,Berkeley; and Mills College. In July 2005 she leads her first workshop in Greece at the Skopelos Foundation. Linda regularly conducts workshops: throughout California since 1983; Kala Institute, Berkeley, 1983 - 2000; Il Bisonte International School of Graphic Art 2004; Santa Reparata International School of Art 1996-2001; SACI,

•Welcome and Farewell Dinners. "Welcome" pizza/pasta dinner included in tuition. Students are invited to an
